



A Tribute to Glenn Beall

As we reflect on the life of Glenn Beall, we celebrate a man whose influence on our profession and community will endure for generations. Glenn was a pioneer in plastics design and manufacturing, but more than that, he was a teacher, mentor, and friend to so many of us.



His career was marked by innovation, from his early patents at Abbott Laboratories to the founding of Glenn Beall Engineering, Inc., later, Glenn Beall Plastics, Ltd. Glenn never measured success by his own accomplishments. He found his greatest fulfillment in sharing knowledge through hundreds of seminars, countless articles, and one-on-one conversations that inspired nearly 30,000 professionals worldwide.

Glenn's dedication to the Society of Plastics Engineers spanned more than six decades. His leadership, vision, and generosity of spirit helped shape not only our industry but also the people within it. His induction into the Plastics Hall of Fame and the Symposium held in his honor at ANTEC 2024 are just two of the many fitting recognitions of a lifetime devoted to advancing our field.

Those of us who had the privilege to know Glenn will remember him not only for his technical brilliance but also for his humility, warmth, and kindness. He encouraged us to think deeply, work with integrity, and always give back. And, any conversation about Glenn must recognize the role his late wife, Patsy, the love of his life, played in Glenn's success. Here's a little secret: The small "P" in Glenn's business logo (above) is meant for Patsy (not plastic, as many of us likely thought).

Although we feel his absence, we are grateful for the legacy he leaves. A legacy of innovation, mentorship, and humanity that will continue to inspire us all.

Later, I was able to get to know Glenn through the PD3 board and we became friends. We would find each other during ANTEC or other conferences or events and spend time discussing the issues of the day for designers, or manufacturers, or molders, and so on. I got to know Patsy as well and, as time moved on, my wife Kim was able to attend some conferences with me. Whenever possible, Glenn was always keen to have dinner with Kim and I to visit and to catch up. I have included a couple of favorite photos, one from ANTEC 2007 in Cincinnati, where I received the SPE Design Award named in Glenn's honor, and the second from ANTEC 2014 in Las Vegas, where we attended a Plastic Hall of Fame Induction ceremony.

Glenn was instrumental in championing my efforts to prepare the manuscript for my book, reading and suggesting thoughts and ideas. Hence, when it was completed and ready for publication Glenn was the only person that I asked to compose the Foreword, and it is exceptional.

It was at ANTEC 2024 in St. Louis that one of my daughters, Dorothy, was able to attend and to meet this guy Glenn that was held in such high regard by her father. That was also the last time that Kim and I were able to visit Glenn in person. Being selected as a speaker for the Glenn Beall Symposium that year was an incredible honor, and indeed one of the great highlights of my career. (cont'd)

"The Gallery of Goofs"

Human beings are not infallible(1). They make mistakes. Plastic product designers are human beings and can therefore be expected to make mistakes. I am reluctant to admit it, but I have made more than my fair share of plastic product design mistakes. My only excuse is that plastic technology was not taught at my university. As a result, I learned about designing with plastic on the job, in the school of hard knocks, by reading the plastics industry magazines and the few relevant books that existed back then.



I like to believe I also learned from my own frequent mistakes. However, it didn't take very long for me to realize that it would be faster and less costly to learn from the mistakes being made by other designer engineers. I started saving stories of these mistakes in design.

In September of 1981, I had the good fortune to be named the design editor of the highly respected Plastic Design Forum (PDF) magazine. This was a wonderful job that gave me an opportunity and the freedom to promote my design philosophy to the plastics products design community.

In the normal course of events, I wrote an article about a plastic part that failed due to a lack of attention to the basic plastic part design guidelines. That mistake resulted in the death of an innocent person. This article was well-received and the PDF editors asked for more stories about why plastic parts failed and how those failures were eliminated. After a few part failure articles, the editors established a recurring PDF column entitled "The Gallery of Goofs". They chose the word goof(2) instead of failure or mistake as those words sounded too harsh in the politically correct society we were living in at that time. For obvious reasons, the names of the people, companies, and suppliers mentioned in these articles were changed to protect the guilty. In some articles, the application was also disguised.

I have been designing plastic parts since 1957. Unfortunately, the same mistakes I made over sixty years ago are still being made today. I admit that my work as a consultant and expert witness in plastic product failure litigations brings me into contact with more plastic part failures than the average product designer. Be that as it may, there is obviously something missing in how plastic designers are being educated.

With that thought in mind, SPE's Product Design and Development Division will be including some of the PDF Gallery of Goofs articles in future newsletters. Hopefully, those reading the newsletter will benefit by learning about these reviews of real-life plastic part failures and how these defects were resolved.

GLENN & PATSY BEALL

"At the heart of Glenn's life was his profound and enduring love for his wife and lifelong partner, Patsy Jo (Wheeler) Beall. They were high school sweethearts and shared an exceptional marriage that spanned 61 years. Their partnership was far more than companionship; it was a shared journey of mutual support and ambition."



For more than six decades, Patsy and Glenn Beall were true partners in life and work. Their story began in high school, where they met and began a journey that led to 61 years of marriage. Patsy worked to support Glenn through college, later joining him at Abbott Laboratories before the two of them launched their own firm, Glenn Beall Engineering Inc., in 1968. From then on, everything they built, they built together.

Glenn often said his greatest "secret weapon" was Patsy, his wife, his "sleep-in secretary," and the steady force behind his career. She supported his volunteer efforts, his industry leadership, and his passion for preserving plastics history. Just days before her passing, the Society of Plastics Engineers recognized that devotion by inducting her as an honorary member.

The Bealls also shared a beloved tradition: their annual Thanksgiving card, sent for 36 years with photos, humor, and reflections on time passing. Their final card admitted, "The team is aging, and we reluctantly conclude that the time has come to end the tradition." It closed, as always, with both their names, a reminder of how inseparable they were.

Patsy passed away in 2014, after facing cancer with quiet courage. Reflecting on their life together, the Bealls once wrote: "We wonder what happened to all of those years. Some say they rushed or slipped by; others claim they don't know where the time went. In our case, we were having so much fun that the years danced by and we didn't notice the passage of time."

According to notes by Glenn's mother, Lillie.

"This rock has a story: When Glenn was just a little boy, he would go down the road a little ways and sit on this rock and wait for his dad to come in from the field, and then he got a ride on whatever machine was in use that day back to the house. I could watch him from the kitchen window. He always went early (never late, you know!) and I suspect, settled all the problems of his world while waiting!"

The delivery of "The Thinking Rock" to Gurnee in 1971 was a surprise gift to Glenn. It was evidently retrieved and delivered (180 miles) by his mother, Lillie Beall, his sister Dorothy (and Bob) Warren, and friend Don Harrington. Lillie wrote on the back of one of the pictures, "I can't believe it! We really surprised him once!"




Glenn's great nephew, Andy Colgan, plans to move Glenn's Rock back to Stark County so it can continue to provide stories and a history to their family in the years to come.
